MANAGING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The NOTL Museum continued to thrive during another long year under the COVID pandemic. The openings and closures continued, but we still managed to support and engage our community both locally and online!

The most popular program in 2021 was the Poppy display that adorned the exterior of our Museum for the memorial flower's 100th Anniversary. It was fitting that the display was featured on our 1875 high school building as several of our local boys would have attended school there before enlisting. I think the most rewarding part was engaging with the hundreds of onlookers, some of whom travelled great distances to see it, and hearing their touching memories of relative veterans. Students from Royal Oak visited on November 11th and when I asked them what they thought it represented, one boy said he thought the poppies represented individual soldiers and they lead up to heaven where they are now. I was left speechless and teary-eyed from that very beautiful interpretation. The poppy volunteers are looking to expand the project for 2022, so look forward to that in November!

The Community Courtyard was put to great use in 2021 by several community members, visitors, and programs! The Healthy Communities Fund provided new accessible benches with coffee tables, a garbage receptacle, free internet, and a tent for anyone to enjoy. Our gardening volunteers kept the space beautiful so we could all enjoy a moment to ourselves. We also hosted many events in there such as the Treasures Sale, Yoga, Kid Curator Camp and more!

We were happy to finally be able to launch the quiet phase of our Building History, Strengthening Community Capital Campaign in 2021. It is time for the NOTL Museum to become fully accessible, so no one has to feel excluded from learning about our shared history. We are ready to finally have the programming space we need for the many popular activities we host and the collections space to properly house and expand Niagara-on-the-Lake's collection. Finally, I am looking forward to revamping our permanent exhibition to include Indigenous and Black stories as well as more about the villages, wineries, and agricultural history of this community. The Tiny Museum

The school programming to accompany the Tiny Museum was completed in 2021 and several community exhibits were developed to bring the Museum's collection outside our walls. We are excited to finally bring the Tiny Museum out to our favourite community events in 2022!

The Poppy Project

By far our most impactful project of 2021 was the NOTL Poppy Project. Inspired by our friends at the Niagara Falls History Museum who collected thousands of crochetted and knitted poppies to display on their museum, they donated almost 2,000 for us to spread the the project to Niagara-on-the-Lake.

We gathered our own team of local volunteers and started making more poppies to add to the project, including some made of fabric to create a poppy garden. About 40 volunteers along with the 1st NOTL Rangers (Girl Guides) helped to put the moving display together, which was made of over 3,500 poppies!

A very special thanks goes to Davey Tree Expert Company, who donated their crew for the day to trim some trees and attach the installation to the bell tower of our 1875 Niagara High School building, and for sponsorship from the St. David Lion's Club.



With generous funding from the Community Foundations of Canada, through the Healthy Communities Fund, we added a tent to our outdoor courtyard and offered the space to the community. With COVID still impacting distancing measures and building capacity, the Community Courtyard was a space for members, visitors and the public at large to relax, read, have lunch or meet a friend for coffee. We offered free Wi-Fi, benches and shade from the heat. We also held a number of programs under the tent, including:

5 & Dime Movie Nights - Two silent film nights highlighted the work of Charlie Chaplin and Buster Keaton.

Treasures Sale - Our biggest sale ever raised over \$5,000 for the Museum.

Shades of Summer Dinner - The Chamber of Commerce held a version of their popular August event in the courtyard.

Making Her Mark Book Launch and Tea - We launched our new book under the tent and held two tea sittings in partnership with the Friends of Fort George.

Sorella Niagara - This group of artisans held their first ever Summer Market on our property, bringing a new crowd to the Museum.

Yoga - Sonya de Lazzer offered six morning yoga sessions to get us moving.

Summer Camp - Our Kid Curators returned for a week in-person and made great use of the tent for camp.





WIRTUAL PROGRAMS & TAKE-OUT EVENTS

As waves of the pandemic continued through 2021, so did our need to provide virtual and take-home programs & events for the community. We also continued to engage and grow our audiences on social media.

Lecture series - a total of 13 virtual lectures were delivered via Zoom on a variety of topics from the Queenston Quarry to Treaties & Land Claims in Ontario.

Members' Trivia Night - Members joined us online for a fun night of trivia using the app Kahoot! We played 6 rounds and offered a prize to the winner of each round.

Doc Club - a virtual monthly meetup from September to December to discuss and debate a wide range of Canadian and international documentaries. NOTL Mini Docs - with funding from the Niagara Community Foundation and the Niagara Region, Babs Worthy produced three mini documentaries to add to our growing digital collection:

"Black History - A Hidden History",
"Fruit & Farming in Niagara: A History
of Dirt & Diesel", and "All Along the
Waterfront: A History of the
Waterfront Industries". They each
explore often unknown parts of our
community's history and are
presented in a short and accessible
format. You can view them on our
YouTube channel.

Drive-Thru Pop-Up Pig Roast - We brought back this take-out dinner in partnership with PigOut Catering as a way to greet the community while people were unable to visit us in person, with more than 180 meals distributed.

History in the Vineyard (at home) - After a successful event in 2020, we partnered again with the Friends of Fort George, Ravine Vineyard Estate Winery, Ruffino's Pasta Bar & Grill, and The Garrison House to deliver three of these take-out fundraisers in 2021. Overall, we raised just over \$10,000 for the Museum.

EXHIBITIONS

MAKING HER MARK: The Women of Niagara-on-the-Lake
Oct 28, 2020 - Oct 24, 2021

This exhibit explored the everyday stories of remarkable NOTL women - courageous environmentalists, heritage activists, artists, scientists, war heroes, teachers, matriarchs, politicians, and professionals. These women, who have made their mark on our community, range from our early history to the most recent passing of significant influencers in 2020.

PHOTOGRAPHIC MEMORY November 7, 2021 - April 30, 2022

This exhibition explores photographs and memories of our community from 1945-1985, during a period when Niagara-on-the-Lake was described as "just a quiet, little town". Even if you didn't grow up in Niagara-on-the-Lake, the photographs in the exhibition are calling cards for nostalgia. They remind us of all of a time in our lives when things were simpler.

VIRTUAL EXHIBITIONS

GOOGLE ARTS & CULTURE

We added new research to one of our online exhibitions, Niagara-on-the-Lake's Black History, originally created in 2018. COLLECTIONS & RESEARCH

In 2021 we had 19 donors with 99 items collected. Some of the highlights are:

- Cast iron tools that date back to 1935 when boilers were introduced at Greaves Jams factory.
- A Trunk that belonged to May Fifield, a girl who attended Our Western Home.
- A colour lithograph of the Mississauga Point Lighthouse.
- A strawberry carrier that was used by a local resident when she picked strawberries on a farm in NOTL during the summer months.
- Margarita Howe's Royal Canadian Army Service Corps (RCASC) Uniform.
- Report Cards and Class Photographs for Margaret Swayze.


We saw a decline in the number of research requests during the pandemic. We also limited public access to the collection in order to decrease potential exposure of our resources, which cannot be sanitized after contact. In a typical year we average around 250 requests, but in 2021 we handled approximately 92 requests from researchers.

We are continuously uploading more of our <u>collection online</u>. Summer staff and volunteers digitize and write web descriptions for our online database. We currently have 4,783 items listed online. Keep checking our website www.notlmuseum.ca under the "Collections and Research" section, as we are always adding new content.


PUBLICATIONS
