


EARLY APOTHECARY ADVERTISING by John G. Sayers

This advertising postcard has two uninteresting personas – maybe even three? First, it's a 'modern' card, snubbed by many collectors. They like postcards from the Golden Age of Postcards, leading up to the First World War.

Second, it's a reproduction, a status anathema to almost every collector under the sun. Why collect a copy when you can hunt for the original? And in regard to this hideous artwork, why even look for the original?

But it's the third aspect that is very, very interesting and makes it a valuable Niagara-on-the-Lake research tool. The original image is shown as copyright in 1871, an advertisement for a Patent Medicine – Dr. Pierce's Golden Med. Typically at the time, a strong mixture fortified with a high precentage of alcohol cured many of the diseases known to the Western world.

The fact that it was published in Buffalo brings it close to us, and the caption at the foot, 'Our Artist in Niagara' cements it as being in our region. At this level, it could be any regional apothecary.

What is most interesting is the narrative on the back of the card. It was reproduced by The Apothecary at Niagara-onthe-Lake. In other words, there was a previous reproduction before the reproduction that stands before us, because this is a reproduction of the Apothecary's promotion of some years earlier.

This Apothecary initial advertising card is reportedly in the collection of a Mrs. L. F. Redden. And it wasn't a single effort – there is reportedly an entire series of them. How many in the series? Four? Eight? Ten? How embarrassing – I have never seen any before this example and I am familiar with most of the postcards in local collections, including the Museum's.

So, if you encounter a postcard that could be described as an ugly reproduction, look at the back. It could be a reproduction like this one, or a reproduction originally made by The Apothecary, or maybe even the original ephemera. Happy hunting!

Colourful advertising trade cards flourished from the 1860s to the early 1900s. Selected from the collection of Mrs. L. F. Redden, this is one in a series reproduced by Niagara Apothecary, Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ontario, Canada.



Our upcoming exhibition is titled *Bound and Determined: Chloe Cooley, Enslavement, and the Fight for Freedom,* and will be on display June 2 - November 13, 2023.

Canadians tend to pride themselves on knowing that our country was a safe haven for people escaping enslavement from the United States. However, what Canadians don't realize is that slavery existed here for over 200 years. About 600 enslaved people of African descent lived in Upper Canada (Ontario) until 1834, and at least 80 lived in Niagara-on-the-Lake (NOTL).

This year marks the 230th Anniversary of the passing of the first anti-slavery legislation in the British Empire, which was passed right here in NOTL.

And it is all thanks to a strong-willed Black woman named Chloe Cooley. This exhibition commemorates this anniversary and the legacy that Chloe left behind. We are very fortunate to have both Rochelle Bush and Natasha Henry-Dixon, join us as Co-Curators for this exhibition.

COLLECTIONS CORNER

During our last collections meeting, we accessioned this fantastic photograph of the Shepherd Boats Ladies Baseball Team. The team played between 1948 and 1950 and consisted of players from Niagara and Virgil. They played games in Lincoln County and their home games were at the Legion Ball Park. In 1949, this team became the Lincoln County Champions, when they defeated the Grimsby Peach Queens.
