My name is **Bear Lyu**, and I am a Master's student at Brock University learning history. It is an honour to work as the Project Assistant this summer at the museum for my Co-op position. As an international student, I did not learn much about the local history of the Niagara Region, yet the knowledge I gained in this position exceeded my expectations. I am able to learn the history of Niagara-on-the-Lake through non-academic methods.

This summer I was able to help with the digitization of the NOTL Museum archive. So far, I have uploaded more than 2000 items to the PastPerfect system with scanned images. I also set up displays of artifacts for the Tiny Museum and attended events out in the community. It has been an extremely interesting work term here at the Museum, and I thank all the members that I had a chance to chat with and meet over these three months. This has been a valuable learning experience that I will carry forever.

My name is **Paige Groot**, and I am a history student at Brock University starting my master's research in environmental and digital history this fall. I had the pleasure of working at the museum this summer as the Curatorial Assistant. It was a delight to work so closely with the staff here at the museum, and I am especially grateful for the welcoming and supportive environment fostered by Sarah, Shawna, Amy, Babs and Katelynn. I had the opportunity to work on a range of exciting projects including digitizing archival documents and creating web-descriptions for artifacts, curating my own exhibits, and assisting with camp.

My time at the museum has given me an opportunity to improve my critical thinking and research skills. I have also learned a lot about collections management and how to effectively use exhibits to communicate history to the public. I am especially thankful for the opportunity to design an exhibit of my own choice, titled "Ride On: Niagara's Bicycle History," focused on a snapshot of Niagara's rich cycling history. This exhibit was inspired by a newspaper article I read while digitizing documents that described Niagara-on-the-Lake's unique Gymkhana tournament. The highlight of designing this exhibit was working closely with Pam Mundy, who designed a beautiful cycling costume. I had the pleasure of wearing that costume and it is now on display. A big thank you to everyone who made my short time here so memorable; this was an incredibly valuable learning experience.

The Tiny Museum Hits the Road

Since the Tiny Museum was built in the spring of 2020, we have been unable to take our mobile museum out into the community. But with festivals and events (finally!!) in full swing, we have been taking it out into the community to bring the history of our town to YOU!

We were at Fort George celebrating Canada Day with an exhibition about Niagara Camp during the First World War, and we were surrounded by cherries and cherry pies at St. Mark's Cherry Festival on July 9. August was a busy month with us at the Canada Summer Games 13 for 13 Festival that was in Simcoe Park, and a few days later we were out again at the Peach Festival on Queen Street! The Tiny Museum even made a weekend appearance at The Gardens at the Pillar and Post.

We are very grateful to Peter Wright who has been hauling the Tiny Museum and to our wonderful volunteers that have helped at these events. We have more planned with our mini mobile museum throughout the fall, so you'll just have to check out our weekly e-blast to find out where the Tiny Museum will be next!

Digitization Project Discoveries

Digitizing the archive collection has been an amazing opportunity and a lot of fun. Nearly 2,500 items have been digitized, with descriptions and search words added into the catalogue files. Many ledgers and diaries have been scanned from front to back, which will be a great resource for researchers. Over 8,250 scans have been produced during this project. I used a large bed scanner, a tabletop book scanner, and a digital camera to produce images for the collection items.

Since the last newsletter, many interesting items have been digitized. A few of my favourites are three ledgers that cover the vital records for 1848 through 1856; one recording deaths, another recording births, and lastly recording marriages. There is also a notebook from March of 1867 that has a recorded census of the people living in the Town of Niagara.

The image below is a scan from a scrapbook (987.5.315.8) which is number 8 in a set of 15 books. The clippings are

laid out chronologically from March 16 through to May 8, 1917, following the happenings of the Great War. The articles that were saved in this book outline the battles, setbacks and advancements of the Allied forces. Maps, political cartoons, and photos of important people are also included. While this scrapbook is not directly related to events in Niagara-on-the-Lake, it does show how important world events can be for a small community.

I have also been working on new online exhibits through Google Arts & Culture. Recently completed is an exhibit on the 8th Scouting Jamboree that was hosted in Niagara-on-the-Lake in 1955. Over 11,000 people travelled to Niagara-on-the-Lake from around the world for this week long event.

Coming soon is an online exhibit about the Niagara Apothecary featuring product labels from the collection.
